Intergenerational Civil Rights Study Travel

Overview: This study travel experience provides a unique opportunity to learn about the Civil Rights movement with a visiting group of people who were there as foot soldiers in the struggles for justice and freedom. Previous participants in this course have described it as “life-changing.”

Highlights:

Encountering the history and legacy of slavery, Jim Crow, the Civil Rights movement of the 1950s in Tennessee, Mississippi and Alabama with an intergenerational group that includes undergraduates from the University of St. Thomas and students from the Selim Center for Lifelong Learning.

Meeting veterans of the Civil Rights struggles in Memphis, Tennessee; and Jackson, Mississippi and Montgomery, Alabama.

Examining the ways in which the stories of this history are told through diverse vernacular and corporate museums.

Engaging with younger activists involved in the current struggles for social justice.
